Member Biography – Karen Butter

I was born in Indiana but left the Midwest to attend college in the Bay Area. After graduating with an AB in Sociology from UC Berkeley in 1970 (the class without a commencement due to the war demonstrations) I completed my Masters in Librarianship in Kansas and worked in Kansas City as a hospital library for a few years. I spent most of my career as an academic health sciences librarian working at the University of Utah, Johns Hopkins and for the last 25 years at UCSF, serving as the University Librarian (Library Director). It was a wonderful job and a great career with enormous changes in information technology. I retired in January 2016 and, to keep busy, I am the Action Co-Chair for the League of Women Voters Alameda and, currently, President of the Board of the Alameda Free Library Foundation. I like to garden, read, cook and travel. I just returned from a road trip a weeks ago to see spring flowers and hike state and national parks and last fall spent 3 weeks in Bali.

College of Alameda Scholarship Recipients

My name is Sharon and I am 23 years old. I am a 4th year student at College of Alameda and I have been a resident of Alameda for about 17 years. As a young adolescent, I was once a truant and struggled to understand the importance of education. I was filled with remorse to have wasted so much time; but better late than never as I gradually returned to my studies. I'm currently waiting for admission into SFSU/SJSU for the upcoming Fall 2017. I have maintained a 3.0 GPA for several consecutive semesters all while working 2 jobs to support my living, food, and school expenses. I moved out from home at an early age because of the perpetual negativity that happened daily. I would never forget the feeling of being lost, scared, and disconnected from the most important people of my life. My attendance in school was sporadic, but nonetheless I was trying even with all the stress and pressure of work.

Even with the adversities going on in my life, I never gave up on myself or my education because I want to graduate and give back to the community one day. I later joined student government; which ultimately became my safe haven. It was a place where I felt accepted, appreciated for my efforts, and nothing but positivity. I had peers who were supportive and studious, motivating me to challenge myself. My greatest achievement during this time was when I was appointed as Secretary of Office. I gained valuable experience during my time in student government. I learned how to run meetings and events, create agendas, take minutes, and how to empower myself through the ample supply of resources that the school had to offer. I attended seminars, educational workshops, and coordinated campus events as well as reconditioning campus infrastructure. Being in student government kept me on track in my classes; I picked up new study habits and was fully committed in going to tutoring. I want to continue to pursue my goals in education and to utilize the knowledge and experience that I've acquired to help others.

I view my volunteering work with Girls Inc. as a powerful means of reducing the underrepresentation of women in STEM by empowering low-income and culturally diverse young women to explore their passion for science.

When it comes to my personal life, after my childhood in war-torn Iraq, I have emerged fearless and unstoppable when it comes to achieving my educational and career goals. In my home country, I faced significant challenges. During the 2003 invasion of Iraq, I lived with the thundering sound of Apache helicopters and bombardments for months. Helplessly, I would gather with my family in a narrow hallway in our house to remain distant from the fragile windows.

After moving to the United States in 2013 with my family as war refugees, I faced an immense cultural shift and all its associated challenges, such as racism, language barrier, financial barriers, and homesickness. I strived to overcome those obstacles and stepped further out of my comfort zone to seek and take advantage of any educational and career opportunities available. Eventually, my goal is to study Chemical Biology and develop pharmaceutical drugs and treatments for unmet and under-met medical needs around the globe.
