AAUW Fundraising

AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF):

This fund works to challenge sex discrimination in higher education and the workplace. Our resources range from community outreach programs to backing of major cases. Sex discrimination today takes a variety of forms: unfair pay, pregnancy discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual assault, and violations of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 can affect both women and men. LAF addresses these barriers by informing people of their rights and using the legal system to seek justice and change. AAUW provides legal case support, finds legal help, promotes knowing your rights at work and on campus, and provides case support travel grants and outreach grants. AAUW Fellowships, Grants and Endowments:

AAUW recently announced that due to the generosity of AAUW members and supporters, more than \$3.7 million in funding for fellowships and grants was awarded to 250 women scholars and non-profit organizations for the 2017-2018 academic year. WASHINGTON — American Association of University Women Chief Executive Officer Kimberly Churches released the following statement on the Trump Administration's decision to rescind the <u>Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals</u> (<u>DACA</u>) program.

"AAUW is proud to <u>be part of a community that fights for the civil rights</u> of all Americans, including immigrants. We stand, and will continue to stand, with the nearly 800,000 Dreamers and DACA recipients. This action by the Trump administration is a firm rejection of one of America's founding principles: that with hard work and education anyone can achieve their own version of the American dream.

At AAUW we understand the impact that education exerts on the lives of students and on the nation's overall prosperity and strength. We remain committed to increasing opportunities in education for all women and girls. One quarter of DACA recipients are enrolled in postsecondary education and another third of the recipients are high school students weighing options to further their education upon graduation.

With the rescinding of DACA that American dream will be shattered, effectively slamming the door to opportunity for these students. Congress now has the opportunity to emerge as a moral leader on this issue by passing the bipartisan, bicameral Dream Act, which would offer much-needed relief and protection for DACA recipients. AAUW will continue to stand by immigrant students and strongly defend their right to an education. The future of our nation depends on it."
