On Thursday, October 19, the Museum Group will go to Stanford University to see the **ANDERSON COLLECTION AT STANFORD**.

Stanford University has become home to the core of the Anderson Collection, one of the world's most outstanding private assemblies of modern and contemporary American art. It includes major works by Vija Celmins, Richard Diebenkorn, Robert Irwin, Willem de Kooning, Joan Mitchell, David Park, Jackson Pollock, Martin Puryear, Mark Rothko and Clyfford Still. Gallery texts found throughout the installation were developed by PhD students in Art History at Stanford University.

We'll see Manuel Neri creations. The exploration of the human figure has been the pursuit of artists for millennia. Manuel Neri (b. 1930), a California native, has spent a lifetime accentuating the gesture, surface, and materiality of the figure. He renders his work in several different mediums that include plaster, marble, bronze, and paper.

#### **Helen Harris**

Upon Joe's death in the early 90's, I left the state to get an MFA in Creative Nonfiction at the University of Montana and to teach college composition there and in Colorado Springs.

Since my return to California, I have mostly taught composition part-time at Laney College – a campus I can see from my upstairs deck here in Marina Village -- until recently, when I found a job even closer to home: across the street from our condo at Argosy University. My husband Tom Jenckes and I were married in 2007. We have been traveling quite a lot since then.

I volunteer at Dewey's Café (Alameda Main Library); belong to an Alameda book group, Literate Ladies, that's been going since the 70's; do swim aerobics at Mariner Square; ride my bike; and, of late, play "Itsy Bitsy Spider" with my brand-new, first-time-ever grandson Ozzy.

#### Mary Oppedahl

I am 71 years old, born in Duluth, Minnesota and, thankfully, my parents moved to San Francisco when I was seven years old. My parents, my brother, who is almost two years older than I, and I lived in the outer Sunset District until I was 15 years old, when we moved to Oakland, where I learned for the first time, the sun in California shines before noon.
