Presidents Message

As I write this on April 10, 2018, Equal Pay Day, when women's average earnings catch up with what men earned the year before (women make on average 80% of a men's average salaries) there are some glimmers of hope. In today's San Francisco Chronicle it was reported that the Ninth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco ruled that **employers cannot set different pay levels for women and men doing the same job by relying, even in part, on their salary at a previous job.** The ruling was written by **Judge Stephen Reinhart** before his death on March 29, 2018 who noted that paying employees different amounts based on what they were paid at their former jobs "perpetuates the very gender-based assumptions about the value of work that the Equal Pay Act was supposed to end"

This may now go to the U.S Supreme Court, but Judge Reinhardt leaves a legacy of advocating for women and fighting "the financial exploitation of working women embodied by the gender pay gap (which) continues to be an embarrassing reality of our economy."

Our Alameda Branch's contribution to recognizing Equal Pay Day was to sponsor a **Financial Literacy** Workshop for Students (and their parents!) with the College of Alameda. At this workshop I presented information from AAUW's excellent 2017report *Deeper* in Debt, Women and Student Loans which describes the differential impact of loan debt on women, particularly students of color. An excellent panel of presenters addressed money management skills, common misconceptions about financial aid and the costs of transferring to four year universities to complete bachelors degrees. Finally, our AAUW Oakland/ Piedmont former President Becky D' Harlingue described AAUW's Start Smart workshop that teaches salary negotiation skills for graduates entering the workforce.

Other local AAUW branches had an "Unequal Bake Sale" on campus and went to the local BART Station and passed out information on equal pay.

IT IS TIME TO VOTE! VOTING OPENS ON APRIL 25, 2018 AND CLOSES ON JUNE 9, 2018. AAUW National has proposed three bylaws amendments and you will be receiving an email or card in the near future inviting you to vote. The amendments are 1) creating three year staggered board terms.

- 2) opening up board service to those outside of the AAUW membership,
- 3) eliminating the degree requirement for membership.

The AAUW National Board of Directors strongly supports the proposed amendments that they believe will help keep AAUW vital as an organization and to enable us to uphold and advance AAUW's mission and ensure

optimal execution at the national board level. Detailed rationales can be found at the AAUW website.

Editorial: at our April Board meeting several of our members reflected on how AAUW has changed over the years over the degree requirement for membership. Even in the fairly recent past, several of our members were not eligible to join. One was a teacher who went to a Normal School for teacher training, one was a nurse who went to nurses training and one went to a college, not to a university. The most recent change was to open membership up to graduates with Associate degrees and we also now have students as affiliate members. It is my view that indeed it is time to eliminate the degree requirement for membership and I endorse the National Board's statement "The board feels strongly that while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement now is perceived by many as counter to our mission and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization."

I urge you to discuss this with your fellow members and to exercise your vote.

As we come to the end of the 2017-2018 program year in May we are going out with BANG! Our College of Alameda Scholarship Fundraiser on April 22 at 3-5pm at Girls Inc 1724 Santa Clara Ave gives us the opportunity to meet President Tim Karas and college faculty. Dues are Due

It has been ten years since National AAUW has raised their fee. This is something from AAUW Nation that explained why they did this: "The AAUW Board of Directors voted in June 2017 to enact the first dues change in almost a decade. Effective March 16, 2018, national dues will increase from \$49 to \$59. Annual dues currently account for 13 percent of AAUW's annual budget. They help to sustain and grow AAUW's programs and work that advances equity for women and girls. A combination of dues, donations, and corporate and foundation funding is critical to supporting AAUW's <u>salary negotiation workshops</u>, groundbreaking <u>research</u>, <u>advocacy</u> efforts, <u>campus leadership programs</u>, and so much more. Member Biography - Ellen Chesnut

I was two years old when I came to America with my father, Sarkis, my mother, Evelyn and my six month old baby brother, Arthur Minas. We started our momentous journey in Mosul, Iraq. It took us six months to come to America with the last phase of the voyage on the Dutch freighter, MS Boschfontein. My mother's aunt, Ferideh Vagim and my mother's half brother, Puzant Shamlian sponsored our family. My father had fifty dollars in his pocket when the ship docked in San Francisco in August of 1941. Both of my parents survived the Armenian Genocide perpetrated by the CUP government in Turkey (1915-1923).

I wanted to be a teacher from childhood on. When school ended for summer vacation I was a lost soul. So I set up a pretend classroom in the basement of my parent's Victorian on 17th Street in the Castro District of San Francisco and proceeded to teach my siblings and neighbor children.

Long story short, I earned my BA from SF State with a Social Studies major and an English minor. A year after that I got my secondary teaching credential. I taught in San Francisco at Benjamin Franklin Jr. High, Herbert Hoover Jr. High, Sunshine Continuation and Mission High School the very school from which I graduated in 1957. I taught for 42 years and absolutely loved my chosen

field. At night I'd take art classes at various schools and started painting and printmaking which I have continued to do. I was a member of the Nanny Goat Hill Gallery, Pacific Art League and SF Women Artists. I had a one woman show of multi-media works and monotype prints at the Nelson Morales Gallery in SF in 1990 called The Armenian Series.

Beginning in the 1980's I started interviewing my father and my mother's relatives. You could say I am the family historian. In 2014, the book I wrote of my father's life *Deli Sarkis: The Scars He Carried* was published. You can order it from Amazon and any independent bookstore can order it for you. My second book: We Armenians Survived; Battle Of Marash 1920 is progressing nicely thanks to Journalism/Music major Sharon M. who is putting it into Word. I am also working with freelance editor, R A M Y A. We are compiling my late husband, Glen's writings which will be anthologized into two books: poetry and prose.
