November AAUW Legal Advocacy Fundraiser Come hear Srinoi Rousseau, J.D. Let's get real, we are aging Protecting ourselves and loved ones from elder abuse

Srinoi (See-Noy) Rousseau J.D., specializes in Elder law. She will address topics such as signs of financial abuse and elder abuse, resources to call upon when faced with these types of issues, support for women aging in place and keeping their financial assets protected.

Srinoi is an attorney in Alameda. Her practice focuses on: conservatorships (including limited conservatorships for the developmentally disabled), Medi-Cal eligibility, wills and trusts including special needs trusts for disabled beneficiaries, trust administration, powers of attorney, and probate. She graduated in 1983 with a J.D. and M.B.A. from Santa Clara University's School of Law and School of Business.

Message from November Board Chair

With our eyes riveted on our upcoming election, this is a good time to appreciate the important role that AAUW has played both in our state and nationally in advancing legislation for equal pay. However, it also takes **courage** for an individual woman to step forward and risk her personal privacy, her family security and her career to sue her employer for unjust treatment under the Equal Pay Act of 1963. AAUW has had a critical role in recent California efforts towards equal pay.

Some of us were fortunate to hear the story of **Aileen Rizo**, a shy, unlikely heroine, mother of three young daughters, who discovered that a recently hired male colleague with less education, experience and seniority had been placed higher on the Fresno County Board of Education's salary scale than her current placement. **Why?** Salary placement is determined by what the person earned in a previous job. As Aileen saw it, this is an inherently discriminatory practice to women.

It was when looking at her daughters that Aileen decided to fight. If **she** did not do it, this issue would continue to affect them. She discovered AAUW to be an organization that supports equal pay for women, and later, during her **six year** court battle, she was invited to apply for litigation support from the AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund, which covers court costs and filing fees, but not attorney fees.

Want to know where your donations on November 10 Legal Advocacy Fundraiser luncheon will go? They go to support Aileen Rizo, and the next step in her legal journey.

So what was the end of the story? After the ruling by the Ninth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals last spring which banned using former salary, even in part, for determining pay for men and women doing the same job, Fresno County Board of Education has appealed to the Supreme Court. We have yet to hear if the U.S. Supreme Court will take up the case this term. Stay tuned.

Museum Group to see art from India's Mithila Region

We will travel to the Asian Art Museum in San Francisco on November 8, (Note that our regular museum day is the second Thursday of the month.) to see the exhibit:

"Painting is my Everything" Art from India's Mithila Region.

With precise skill and bold artistic vision, the 17 contemporary artists included in this exhibition, many of them women, employ a centuries-old regional style to express personal experiences and viewpoints. They paint traditional subjects such as Hindu gods but also use their brushes to document and comment on everyday life as well as national and global events.

Mithila style painting, characterized by visually striking compositions, stylized images, delicately detailed surfaces and vibrant colors, was originally practiced exclusively by women on the walls of their homes. In the wake of a severe drought in the 1960s, this mural tradition was transferred to paper, a format that could be sold to bring much-needed income to rural villages
