Message from the April Board Chair

Our speaker at the March lunch, Dr. Ufoegbune, gave an interesting and well-received speech on education of women and girls in West Africa. Extending our recognition of noteworthy women, our April luncheon will provide us the opportunity to acknowledge, learn about and experience the fulfillment of a two-decade dream of a remarkable woman, Jean Sweeney. The picnic lunch on April 13 at Jean Sweeney Open Space Park will include a tour by Alameda Recreation and Parks Department.

Jean Sweeney is an inspiration – a shining example of what a single person with a lot of help can accomplish. When Jean first learned about an unused railroad yard in 1998, she immediately went to see the property and just knew it should become a public park. She asked the railroad to donate the land which generated smiles, but no land, as they wanted to sell the land for development. Undaunted, Jean worked tirelessly with the many Alameda clubs and committees of which she was a member to lobby the City to change the zoning for the land to open space. The city did so in in 2002. Meanwhile, Jean undertook a tireless search of the legal ownership of the land, discovering in 2003 that the original 1924 contract granted the city the option to repurchase the land from the railway company at the original price. After six years of litigation, the city was able to repurchase the land in 2009.

Years of work kept funding alive, staved off other development at the site, and facilitated the city/community process to determine the park plan. The first phase is now complete and, while Jean died before she could see her dream come true, we can. Please join us on April 13 to honor Jean's remarkable effort, touch base with each other and attend our Annual Membership Meeting.

Don't forget to pass along the AAUW Work Smart online salary negotiation course link to any working women in your families and among your friends and their families. This is an opportunity to make a positive, real-world change to the pay inequity that still hampers women's advancement, to this day.

SAVE THE DATE: Great News! AAUW has been approved to host an exhibitor booth for a Plant Sale fundraiser for Tech Trek at the annual Alameda Community Earth Day Celebration. We will have one table for selling a selection of plants/other gardening items and share information about AAUW Alameda and Tech Trek. AAUW Work Smart Initiative

AAUW has established a goal of providing salary negotiation training to 100,000 women this year and 1,000,000 women by 2022 in order to help close the wage gap between men and women. AAUW has developed an online training module for individual women to learn salary negation skills. It is available to all, not just members.

To reach its goals, AAUW National is asking its members for their help in making the online training tool available to as many working women as possible. That includes working women in our branch as well as our members' daughters, granddaughters, nieces and friends. The National AAUW office suggests that each of us take the training ourselves so that we can explain its specifics and value to those women to whom we will reach out.

Museum Group:

We will be going to see Peter Paul Rubens's paintings at the Legion of Honor Museum on Thursday, April 11.

Peter Paul Rubens (1577–1640) was both a prodigious artist and one of the most extraordinary figures of the seventeenth century. Renowned for his virtuosic handling of oil paint, his depictions of taut dramatic action, and his sensuous coloring, Rubens was also an international diplomat, a shrewd businessman, a well-read intellectual, a friend to scholars and monarchs, and the master of a prolific workshop. His early biographers regularly present Rubens as an aristocrat-artist, the favorite of Europe's noble class, but this was far from an assured outcome. *Early Rubens* will focus on what is arguably the artist's most innovative period of production, from 1608 until about 1620. It was during these years that Rubens rose to the first rank of Flemish painting through a series of social and artistic choices that laid the groundwork for his international fame and established a visual style that would guide ambitious painters for generations to come.

There will be a docent lecture at The Alameda Free Library on Monday, May 13 at 6:30 on **Rubens**. Please put that on your calendar.
