
Last month we lost, much too soon, a vibrant and influential member of our AAUW Branch, Patti Heimburger.

Patti was a Past President, Membership Vice President, Tech Trek team member, and founder of the College of Alameda Scholarship Program. As President, she initiated the outreach at the College of Alameda through programs on Human Trafficking and Women's Equality issues, including a showing of Jennifer Siebel Newsom's "Miss Representation" with panel discussion, cosponsored by LWV. She participated in our Evening Book Group, Ethnic Dining Group, and Outreach Committee. When any sector of our organization needed help, she was always there to offer her assistance.

Patti was an artist, author, patron of the arts, and supporter of many non-profit groups. She loved to paint, read, and travel, and had written some family stories. Her numerous interests included the African Library Project, Be On Our Side, End U.S. Military Aid To Israel., Benjamin F. Remembering Joan Narahara, Long-Time Member and Friend

We are sad to say that our long-time member, Joan Narahara, passed away on March 13, at age 86. Joan was a second generation Alamedan who attended Porter Grammar School before being interned in Topaz, Utah, during WWII. After her return to the island, she graduated from Alameda High School with honors. She received her bachelor's degree in microbiology and certificates in medical technology and exfoliative cytology from UC Berkeley/UCSF, followed by two years at Johns Hopkins Medical Center, in Baltimore, doing cancer research. Joan returned to work for Alameda County as a lab technician, cytologist and microbiologist, retiring after 40 years.

Joan was a patron of the arts, education and the environment, supporting the San Francisco Symphony and Opera for over 40 years, as well as her alma mater, the National Wildlife Federation, and the World Wildlife Fund. Her love of travel took her all around the United States, most of Europe, the Middle East, South America, Japan, Australia and China. She was an avid reader, a lover of fine music, and loved to discuss books she had read and great musical performances she had attended with her friends.

No matter how busy Joan was with her work and family, she always had time for active participation in her community and the organizations with which she was affiliated. She was active with the American Association of University Women (AAUW) for many years, was a former President of the League of Women Voters (LWV) of Alameda, and served on the Alameda City Council Planning Board for two terms as President and Vice President. We will all miss her kindness, generosity, and fine mind. Few organizations have been as lucky as our Alameda Branch to have such a great member.

Family and friends attended a memorial service in honor of Joan on Sunday, April 14, 2019, at the Buddhist Temple of Alameda, 2325 Pacific Ave., Alameda.

AAUW Work Smart Initiative

AAUW has established a goal of providing salary negotiation training to 100,000 women this year and 1,000,000 women by 2022 in order to help close the wage gap between men and women. AAUW has developed an **online training module** for individual women to learn salary negation skills. It is **available to all, not just members**.

To reach its goals, AAUW National is asking its members for their help in **making the online training tool available to as many working women as possible**. Museum Group:

1. The museum group will travel to the Iris and B. Gerald Cantor Center for Visual Arts at Stanford on Thursday, May 9, to see the exhibit: Josiah McElheny: Island Universe

According to the Cantor website, "Bringing artist Josiah McElheny's *Island Universe* to the Cantor is a rare opportunity to examine both cutting-edge art and physics. The monumental installation is a visual response to recent theories of the multiverse, an elaboration of the Big Bang theory. The installation is both visually stunning and carefully constructed according to measurements that map the history of time. McElheny worked closely with distinguished Ohio State University professor of astronomy David Weinberg to develop those measurements. The five hanging chandeliers, which incorporate precise scientific calculations, are modeled on the chandeliers of the Metropolitan Opera in New York--iconic midcentury design objects that were made in Vienna in 1965. That year, the first physical evidence of the Big Bang theory became public, launching popular interest in space science. McElheny's installation -- made of chromed metal, transparent handblown glass, and lights -- represents potential universes whose dense origins expand outwards."

2. On Thursday June13, the Museum Group will have its final event of the year. We will travel to the Cohen-Bray House in Oakland for a tour and tea. Cost is \$35 with check made out to Cohen-Bray House and mailed to Judy Sparks, 934 Fountain St. Alameda CA 94501.

In 1882-84, Julia Moser and Watson A. Bray built the house as a wedding present to their daughter Emma who married Alfred H. Cohen on Feb.28, 1884. Mr. Cohen was the son of A.A. Cohen, who had a mansion in Alameda. A.A. Cohen established the San Francisco and Oakland Railroad, the first RR system in Alameda County. More significantly, he was the chief attorney for the Central Pacific Railroad, i.e., the attorney for "The Big Four".

This was before the dredging of the estuary, so it was easier to go between Alameda and Oakland. There were several mansions built in the Fruitvale area of Oakland, but this is the only one that survives. The home is full of family heirlooms and a family ancestor is often a guild. I have toured it several times and found it extremely interesting and educational.

After the tour, tea will be served. They can seat 18 at their dining room table -- therefore, I would like to open the invitation to all of our AAUW members. There are two levels, so stairs will need to be climbed. Please let me know if you are interested by May 20. (Judy Sparks)
