Professor **David C. McGaffey** is President of InterConsult Global, an international consulting firm. He is also Director of the Global Stewards Institute (GSI), a Fulbright Senior Scholar, and a Visiting Professor at University American College Skopje, Macedonia. Professor McGaffey was a U.S. diplomat worldwide for 25 years. His final diplomatic position was as the highest State Department official responsible for relations with the UN's Development agencies. In 1991, he returned to teaching and consulting. He is a long-time Advisor to UNA-USA (East Bay.) He is a specialist in negotiations, global education, and cultural analysis and is the author of numerous books and papers. Professor McGaffey holds a PhD. from Johns Hopkins University - SAIS. He also holds degrees from Harvard and MIT, and The University of Detroit.

Debby Anspach has a B.A. from MSU, Master's Degrees from Wayne State and Claremont, and a Ph.D. from Claremont Graduate School. She was a high school Teacher and K-12 School Counselor for 33 years. AAUW Work Smart Initiative

AAUW has established a goal of providing salary negotiation training to 100,000 women this year and 1,000,000 women by 2022 in order to help close the wage gap between men and women. AAUW has developed an **online training module** for individual women to learn salary negation skills. It is **available to all, not just members**.

To reach its goals, AAUW National is asking its members for their help in **making the online training tool available to as many working women as possible**. That includes working women in our branch as well as our members' daughters, granddaughters, nieces and friends. The National AAUW office suggests that each of us take the training ourselves so that we can explain its specifics and value to those women to whom we will reach out.
