Giving to AAUW: TAX Strategies for Charitable Donations Part II

As mentioned in last month's Newsletter, **"Reduce your taxable income by Helping AAUW"**, people over 70.5 years who must take required minimum distributions (RMDs) from their IRA accounts can reduce their tax burden for 2019 by making charitable donations directly from their IRA accounts (**if you have not already received these funds, of course!**) This can be set up at any point of the year and represent any portion of those RMDs.

So how to benefit AAUW? Give the holder of your IRA, such as Vanguard or Edward Jones, etc., a letter with the name, address, and TAX ID of the Charity and specific designation for the funds.

1. For our AAUW Alameda Branch, there are TWO options that currently qualify as 501(c)(3) entities.

A. For our **Tech Trek Program** the charity is **AAUW CA SPF**, the designation is for **AAUW Alameda scholarships.** TAX ID # **68-0463071**

The addressee is Barbara Krummel, Tech Trek Coordinator, 3258 Liberty Avenue, Alameda CA 94501-3105 (this is important because a form needs to accompany the check to ensure it is credited correctly).

B. For our **College of Alameda Patti Heimburger Scholarships.**

You can make open ended donations to AAUW or you can specify particular fund designations in your instruction letter.

Fund designation choices: **a) Greatest Need Fund** #9110; **b) Education and Training** #4450 -- includes Fellowships, STEM, Title IX; **c) Economic Security** #4449 -- includes Pay Equity, Title VII and Legal Advocacy Fund; **d) Leadership Fund** #4452 includes Campus Action projects and National Conference for Women Student Leaders.

AAUW Alameda Establishes three new Scholarships for College of Alameda Women Students

Due to the generosity of two AAUW branch members and the availability of the matching grant funds donated by Carolyn Gannon from Patti Heimburger's estate, the Board has recognized that we have sufficient funds to offer one \$1,000 scholarship, specifically designated for use for a Study Abroad Course beginning Summer of 2020. This is in addition to the two existing \$1,000 transfer scholarships from the Patti Heimburger Scholarship Fund administered by the Peralta Colleges Foundation.

We have been working with the Peralta Community College District Office of International Education to broadcast the availability of these funds for College of Alameda women students, particularly those interested in studying in a developing country. We are most gratified to make this Study Abroad scholarship a priority for women students, as many students at community colleges have such limited funds that they cannot access the significant educational value of studying in another country. Even with this scholarship, students must raise the full amount, including airfare, from their own fundraising efforts. We look forward to hearing about their experiences upon their return!

Our Branch funds two Scholarships for College of Alameda women students to attend the AAUW National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) at the University of Maryland, Baltimore May 27-30, 2020

The Board has accepted the Fundraising Committee's recommendation that since our transfer and study abroad scholarships are fully funded for this year, we can turn our spring efforts to support women's leadership development. We will provide two \$1,200 scholarships for College of Alameda women students to attend NCCWSL. We have applied for designation as a AAUW CA Special Projects Fund so that all our donations and disbursements to the scholarship winner will be made by AAUW CA SPF. Penny Washbourn has volunteered to be the Coordinator for this project. Any donations should be mailed to her at 501 Lagunaria Lane, Alameda CA 94502 so she can forward them to the correct account. Checks should be made out to **AAUW CA SPF.**

Silver Alkhafaji, one of our new AAUW Alameda Members and attendee NCCWSL last summer has been very instrumental in promoting the value of this leadership experience and we are working closely with the Director of Student Service and Campus Life to ensure a robust nomination process from Faculty and academic counselors begins in January at the beginning of the COA term. Once nominated, students will submit a 500-word essay as part of their application, and a AAUW Alameda Branch/ College of Alameda Faculty and Staff committee will review applications and recommend finalists to interview in person. **We need your help!**

A NEW NCCWSL Scholarship Selection Committee will be formed in the Spring! We are looking for volunteers who are available late February –through late March to review applications and interview finalists. An initial meeting will discuss criteria for selection. <u>Museum Group</u> -- On January 9, the Group will visit the Oakland Museum to view The Burning Man Exhibit

Marvel at the spectacular artwork and large-scale installations from one of the most widely celebrated cultural events in the world when the Museum presents *No Spectators: The Art of Burning Man*. Each year the week-long Burning Man event attracts over 70,000 people to Nevada's Black Rock Desert. Participants create and build Black Rock City, a temporary metropolis where experimental art installations -- some ritually burned to the ground -- are the centerpieces for innovators, makers, and a burgeoning artistic community. The exhibition will illuminate the values of Burning Man through its guiding Ten Principles: Radical Inclusion, Gifting, Decommodification, Radical Self-Reliance, Radical Self-Expression, Communal Effort, Civic Responsibility, Leaving No Trace, Participation, and Immediacy.
