AAUW Career Development Grant awardee Briana Marela Lizárraga is a Latinx composer/artist formerly from Seattle, WA but currently based in Oakland, CA. Pursuing an Master of Fine Arts (M.F.A.) degree in Electronic Music at Mills College, she has returned to a more experimental sound focus than recent albums/work she had released commercially have had. She is known for her work with sampled instrumentation and synthesis performance with MaxMSP, using her voice as a focal point as well as an ambient texture in compositions. Her current interest is in working with surface transducers in live performance and utilizing objects with mapped and coded gestural control. She is working toward her M.F.A. with the overall goal of teaching and inspiring other women to enter this traditionally maledominated field of audio production and music technology.

Another Worthy Cause

R Star Foundation, "Women Helping Women and Children in Nepal", started in 2003, with creation of a beginning solution for the poorest villages in the district of Kavre, Nepal, which has always been a communist-dominated district. The founder, Rosalind Russell, started with money for 89 goats and was able, with collaborations at Nepal's federal level, to get sufficient help to actually give 200 goats to the natives in two diverse villages with a 'pay it back' program to those were gifted. Since 2003, the program is responsible for the distribution of over 15,000 goats beyond the original gifting, and microfinancing was established for a group of 25 women. These loans were otherwise unavailable to residents in the rural villages.

In 2008 R Star opened a school, Top of the World-(TOW)-Nepal (TOW-N). In addition to traditional Nepali studies, they teach peace for twenty minutes per day by programs created by Rosalind and expanded by an intern from SOKA University. Student-created peace flags are sent to Nepal by American students who learn of the Foundation's work through presentations. In return, the TOW-N students create peace flags as part of their "recreational learning," which Rosalind brings to the USA. The villagers and other government schools are now joined in our peace efforts. Our above average students teach peace to the government schools, which adds to our reach to peace in a long standing warring area. Our reach to teach peace extends to the adults as children return home and share what they are doing as children do... thus teaching peace in ways we cannot!

To help spread the word about the peace program, Rosalind wrote the little book "REACH TO PEACE." Website Coordinator JoAnn Smith Ainsworth's novel, "Expect Betrayal," Book 3 of her award winning WWII paranormal suspense series, is available on pre-order as an e-book -- https://books2read.com/b/3Lp7zN.

BriefPlot Summary: The mainstream novel "Visible Means of Support" is, on one level, the life story of a secret. Middle-class Ginger Fiske and her twenty-one-year-old son conspire to keep her mother/his grandmother from learning about his arrest, conviction, and imprisonment for conspiracy to deal cocaine. Set in the "just say no" mid-1980s, the book has wide appeal because its story is told through the eyes of the felon, his mid-forties mother (also a teacher), and his grandmother, Alice. While it tells a suspenseful story with its share of anguish, it is also in some places quite funny. It is set in the mother's Oakland high school, her Oakland hills home, a gated community in Colorado Springs, and two federal prisons, one in Texarkana and the other near Denver.
