From our AAUW California State Board -- REMEMBERING THE PAST

At our upcoming State Convention, we will meet some women from the past who have had a great impact on our lives. Did you know that the first woman to run for President of the United States was Victoria Woodhull? She believed that women already had the right to vote because the 14th and 15th amendments had given all citizens the right to vote. In 1872, she selected the former slave and abolitionist leader Frederick Douglass as her running mate and ran for the highest office in our land, representing the Cosmo-Political Party, but the government refused to put their names on the ballot.

After she and her sister made a fortune as stockbrokers, they started a newspaper that advocated, among other things, sex education, short skirts, and women's suffrage. Perhaps you will run into Ms. Woodhull at the convention or maybe you will see the great suffragist, Elizabeth Cady Stanton or the brave and wonderful Harriet Tubman!

<u>The Museum Group</u> will go to the Crocker Art Museum in Sacramento on Thursday, March 12 to see the exhibit "Granville Redmond: The Eloquent Palette"

The exhibit has visual charms showing California landscapes of 100 years ago and a great backstory of a deaf artist finding success. Born in Philadelphia in 1871, Redmond was brought by his parents to San Jose soon after a bout with scarlet fever left him permanently deaf. In 1879 his parents sent him to an "enlightened" boarding school called California Institution for the Education of the Deaf and Dumb (today, it is the California School for the Deaf, located in Fremont). There Redmond studied art with Douglas Tilden, who was also deaf and became a friend.

He progressed rapidly at the San Francisco Art Institute and, eventually, in Paris. He exhibited one painting at the Salon, but it did not win a prize. When his funds ran out, Redmond returned to CA, became an illustrator in Los Angeles, got married, and raised 3 children. He couldn't just paint for painting's sake alone -- he had to support his family. He bounced from Los Angeles to Monterey, to Menlo Park, to San Francisco. He supplemented his income with work as an actor in silent films, backed by his younger friend, Charlie Chaplin.

Around 1906, when the California legislature named the poppy as the state flower, Redmond made the significant decision to become a specialist. Of the 83 paintings in the exhibition, 35 could be described as fields of poppies. Others are fields of lupines, dotted with the orange flowers. Even Redmond felt that there was an overabundance of "poppy" paintings and he couldn't devote himself to the works he wanted to paint. "People will not buy them," he said. There are also some moodier paintings, Redmond's so-called "tonalist" works, which provide relief.
