AAUW Tech Trek California will be offering a virtual Tech Trek experience for 2021 (there will not be an in-person camp this year). Below is a brief description, and if you click on the "2021 Virtual Camp" link, you'll find lots of details including volunteer opportunities, dates, schedule, topics and testimonials. Of course, we're disappointed that we can't offer an in-person experience again but this camp was offered to a group in southern California last summer and the camp director, Dr. Mimi Isaac, is a dynamic and committed leader.

Our Tech Trek Committee is beginning the selection process to recruit current 7<sup>th</sup> grade girls who love STEM as well as inviting our 2020 girls to attend.

Virtual Tech Trek is designed to provide campers with exposure to computer science and engineering, along with workshops designed to explore individual STEM specialties more deeply using a hands-on or interactive approach. Hands-on activities, inspirational speakers, and interactive workshops help to make STEM subjects fun as well as educational. Trained instructors and coaching staff including near-peer Tech Trek alumnae, work alongside credentialed teachers, and women in STEM-related careers.

This is a week-long virtual camp for rising 8th grade girls. The camp is centered on a morning project-based robotics/engineering/coding class that meets daily and results in a personalized creation by week's end. After lunch, the campers hear from inspirational women for an hour, then participate in one or more 90-minute hands-on or interactive science, technology, engineering, and math workshops to encourage fun while learning. They can return for evening workshops with girls from another country, social activities, or even parent sessions.

### **Alameda Unified School District -- Title IX Compliance**

We have sent the following letter to the AUSD superintendent and board members:

During the 2017 AUSD summer In-service Program for Principals and Counselors, the AAUW Alameda Branch offered a legal presentation on Title IX laws and implications for District and School-level operations. The importance of designation of specific persons with Title IX enforcement responsibilities at both the District and at School levels was stressed, in order to stay in compliance with federal laws. This includes explicit publicity on District and School websites for Title IX information for the Community.

A recent review of the AUSD website finds no personnel specifically identified as the Title IX Coordinator for the District.

We are asking you to rectify this matter so that AUSD can be in full compliance with Title IX legislation.

**NOTE**: This issue has now been resolved by AUSD and there is ongoing communication regarding the visibility and accessibility of the information on the District website.

## **Public Policy News from National AAUW**

On February 2, 2021, my co-chair Sue Miller and I met via Zoom with AAUW Public Policy Director Kate Nielsen and her assistant Robin Lucas, along with state public policy chairs across the nation, to get updates on changes to the public policy landscape with the a new administration and Congress. Here is a summary of what we thought members would like to know:

- 1. AAUW Public Policy team sends notice of our priorities for the new year
  - a. Letter to the President, focused on
    - i. Women's Economic Security
    - ii. Education Access
  - b. Letter to 117th Congress
    - i. Passing the Paycheck Fairness Act
    - ii. Passing the Equity in Education Act
  - c. Both found at aauw.org/resources/policy/documents
- 2. Also outlined Admin and Congressional Priorities
  - a. Biden-Harris in the 1st 2 weeks 41 Exec orders
    - i. Covid, including student-debt relief and opening of schools
    - ii. Anti-discrimination, including removing barriers, DACA relief and a Task Force to reunite families
    - iii. Protecting women's health at home and abroad, including access to abortions
  - b. Coming Legislation from Congress
    - i. Covid relief 1.9 Trillion package
      - 1. Paid sick & family leave extended thru Sept (14 weeks)
      - 2. Increase min wage to \$15
      - 3. Assistance to those at risk of losing jobs &/or their homes
      - 4. \$3B to help women with food relief for their families
      - 5. \$25B emergency fund for child care providers
    - ii. Raise the Wage Act (\$15 by 2025) reintroduced Thursday
    - iii. FAMILY Act (emphasis on access to paid leave) end of this week
    - iv. Paycheck Fairness Act HR7
      - 1. AAUW working on since 1997
      - 2. Reintroduced 2/1
      - 3. Strong bi-partisan support
      - 4. Prohibits retaliation for discussing pay
      - 5. Closes loopholes in Equal Pay Act
      - 6. Can't use prior salary HX in hiring decisions
