Addressing Discrimination against Black Transgender and Gender Non-conforming People

AAUW California supports "freedom in definition of self-identity" as critical to ensuring justice for a diverse and inclusive society. One group that is consistently denied this freedom is black transgender and gender non-conforming individuals. Over the past several years, increasing attention has been focused on the multitude of ways in which these individuals encounter marginalization and discrimination. A recent study by the National Center for Transgender Equality addressed these forms of discrimination through the National Transgender Discrimination Survey. The study highlighted a variety of economic, safety, and physical and mental health challenges faced by transgender and gender non-conforming individuals. Black transgender people had unemployment rates four times the rate of the general population and twice the rate of transgender people at large. A startling 41% of black transgender or gender non-conforming individuals said they had experienced being unsheltered. Black transgender individuals suffered extreme poverty at a rate of 31% which is twice that of transgender individuals of all races and eight times the general US population. Furthermore, 50% of black respondents who attended school while expressing their transgender identity or gender non-conformity reported harassment in the survey. Nearly half of black respondents to the survey had attempted to commit suicide and more than 20% were living with HIV compared to 0.60% of the general population. The findings highlight the profound challenges faced by black transgender and gender non-conforming individuals and point to the need for social justice advocates and government officials to address the intersection between race and gender identity to assure equity of transgender or gender non-conforming citizens.

AAUW members can address the challenges faced by black transgender and gender nonconforming individuals by advocating for legislation that assures an even playing field and addresses the unique housing and healthcare challenges faced by this population. These will help us achieve AAUW-California's public policy goals of equality, inclusiveness and financial security for all women.

Message from Penny Washbourn:



"You might think I am super careful about looking at the sender's email in an unsolicited message, but as a cautionary tale let me tell you of a clever scam I nearly fell victim to yesterday. I have not slept well for a few days while my grandson has been here and I have been responsible for his well being.. There have been a number of issues with him so I have been distracted. I went to check my email before starting out for the day..and found a message from Pay Pal that concerned me.. a charge for over \$600 was being posted to my account for a subscription service to Hot Spot...and I had 72 hours to challenge the posting...This was a large enough amount to scare me.. and so without doing my due diligence on the email, I called the customer service number without checking if this was genuine. (I do have Pay Pal account which I never use). A smooth talking man with an Indian accent kept me on the phone quite a time, always thanking me for still being there and assuring me they would take care of it...but what was very odd(now I come to think about it) he sent me a text to my phone(I had not given him my cell number) as I was calling from my land line...and sent me a code like they do with 2 step verification.

He passed me on to his " supervisor who explained he could not cancel it and I was the one who had to do so with a code from a Pay Pal card. He then asked if there was a Target or Walmart or CVS near me..and I said yes, 10 minutes away.. and so keeping me on the cell phone while I walked to the shopping center , he said that he would talk to me when I reached the parking lot as they might not know what a Pay Pal Card was. I was a bit mystified as I could not imagine Pay Pal having gift cards. When he said there would also be tax on it.. I stopped in my tracks and realized I was in the middle of a "gift card scam" . I told him so and hung up and walked back home. They tried calling a couple of times. As soon as I got back home I forwarded the email to"<u>spoof@paypal.com</u>. They suggest you check your account for recent activity and change your password.

I am humbled by the experience and recognize very clear tactics.. Induce a sense of urgency by having it be a large amount..smooth talking and ensuring you feel they will take care of it, then switching over to a question about how far you are away from the store. Not using the term "gift card" but an ambiguous term such as a "code on Pay Pal Card" and not letting you off the phone while you get to the store.

Thank God my rational brain kicked in with "this is not the way Pay Pal or any legitimate business operates"

But it just goes to show in a state of fatigue or distraction we all can become victims of these scams."

Locally for 2 decades pre-pandemic he and Elizabeth regularly collected food from the Farmers Market for the Alameda Food Bank and worked the Friends of the Library book sales. The San Francisco Chronicle tribute printed May 2 and the memorial service at Greer Mortuary (https://www.greermortuary.com/tributes/David-McGaffey) are iconic showing how big David's life was beyond his roots, his beloved family, his global work and his ideals... Our AAUW Ethnic Dining Group will miss his monthly participation in our home and restaurant meals enjoying world cuisine---his stories always colorful and so memorable. Outside of AAUW, David was also an excellent friend to many people sharing his love of theatre, music, ideas, travel, his wife and daughters.
