Elections Finally Over - How'd We Do in '22?

The election is finally over! In addition to an end to the non-stop requests for donations, AAUW members can be pretty happy with the results. Here are a few highlights:

- 1 woman each was added to the U.S. House and the U.S. Senate, bringing the numbers to 124 (H) and 25 (S)
- Of the total of 149, 54 are women of color
- We lost the most powerful woman in government (Nancy Pelosi) but still have a woman on the Minority leadership team, Minority Whip Katherine Clark
- Governors of 12 states are now women
- 23% of all mayors across the nation are women, including our brand new and **first** female mayor of Los Angeles, Karen Bass
- 20 women won new seats in the California Legislature and 30 female incumbents were reelected, bringing the total to 50 but still just 42%
- All executive positions in California except Governor are filled by women, including Secretary
 of State, Lieutenant Governor, Treasurer, and Controller, as well as the Senate Pro Tem
- Proposition 1 prevailed and women's right to control their own reproductive choices is now enshrined in our constitution.

And here are some fun facts:

- Only 3.2% of all members of Congress to date have been women
- California has sent more women to Congress than any other state a total of 47 to date
- Vermont is the only state that has never sent a woman to either the House or the Senate

The State Public Policy committee thanks each and every AAUW California member who voted, who assisted in our Voter Education (VE) campaign by spreading our messages on social media, who took the pledge to vote for Prop 1 (we had 437 sign up!) and who worked within their branches to do their own VE events.

Many of our members may not know that our College of Alameda NCCWSL Scholarship program still exists! With that impossible acronym...(just think "nick whistle"), these letters stand for the AAUW "National Conference for College Women Student Leaders". This conference has been around for decades and brings second year (and above) students from community colleges and universities from across the country to the University of Maryland for a two day conference. The goal is to develop student leadership skills across five core learning objectives: Leadership Development, Professional Development, Activism, Women's Issues, and Identity and Diversity. Inspiring Speakers are drawn from some remarkable women leaders in all sectors of society. Women are also given the opportunity to focus on their own academic and professional goals and bond with other women from across the country. After all this intense work, students are able to have an extra day for sight seeing in our nation's capital.

Encouraged by our own Alameda member Silver Al Khafaji ,who had attended NCCWSL when she was a student at UC Berkeley, in 2019 we raised money for two scholarships administered by AAUW CA Special projects fund. We set up a nominations process with the College of Alameda, set up an interview and screening committee with representation from the College and our members and interviewed our finalists on Zoom., only to have the in-person event canceled in 2020, 2021 and 2022 due to the Pandemic.

Great news! The in- person conference will take place May 31-June 3, 2023. Our screening committee will be myself, Susan Myers, Silver Al Khafaji, Annette Koch and Tina Vasconcellos VP of Student Services COA.

The review of applications and interviews will be done via Zoom in March. If anyone would enjoy joining us we will have a planning meeting in February, read applications and have an initial meeting to select finalists the second week of March and schedule four half hour interviews the third week of March. Awards must be made by end of March.

Please contact me if you are interested and available during that period of time. It is a most enjoyable process to meet these students.

We will also need to add to our NCCWSL fund through donations and Fund raising activities for 2024. Each scholarship is \$1,500 and covers transportation, registration, room and board and the extra night in the dorm.

Working in a thickly pigmented and textural style, the imagery in Brown's work was often drawn from her personal life. Her paintings frequently depicted women and animals, while later in her career she integrated mystical and New Age imagery using simplified stylizations and strong narrative themes. "How do I know when I've finished a painting?" Brown said in a 1979 interview. "It's when that element of surprise is there. We will go for lunch at THE GROVE, 690 Mission.
