Patricia is a Ph.D. candidate in the Department of Performance Studies at U.C. Berkeley. Performance Studies is an interdisciplinary academic field that uses performance as a lens and a tool to study the world. Patricia's designated semphasis is in the field of women and gender studies.

The AAUW Fellowship grant will enable Patricia to continue her research for and writing of her dissertation which focuses on contemporary black and indigenous women artists in Brazil whose work draws from intergenerational practices and non-Western bodies of knowledge to express resistance to and liberation from continuing forms of colonization with which today's Brazilians still contend.

# **TËCH TREK**

Our 2023 camp selection has begun for an in-person camp at Sonoma State University in Rohnert Park, CA, scheduled for June 18-24. **Tech Trek** is a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) camp designed to develop interest, excitement, and self-confidence in young women who will enter eighth grade in the fall. It features hands-on activities in STEM-related fields. In the residential camps, all sleeping, eating, instructional and recreational facilities are located on a university campus where camps are held. <u>https://www.aauw-ca.org/what-is-tech-trek/</u>. Every girl attending a Tech Trek Science Camp is on a full sponsorship and was first recommended for the program by her middle school science or math teacher. Local AAUW branch coordinators provide the schools and teachers with guidelines for choosing girls who will be successful at camp. This year we have received 30 nominations from 6 of our Alameda middle schools and we will select 7 girls to attend camp. Recommended girls are contacted, along with their parents, and asked to complete an application and to write a short essay on a chosen subject.

Our AAUW Alameda Tech Trek committee members--Linda Preminger, Ellie Barrantes, Shubha Fanse, Jennifer Ayres, Michelle Pero Igo and Barbara Krummel—review the applications, then interview selected applicants. **We'll keep you posted....**

# Women's History Month

March is Women's History Month, a Fitting Time to Observe Transgender Day of Visibility

Each year on March 31, the world observes Transgender Day of Visibility (TDOV) to raise awareness about transgender people. It is a day to celebrate the lives and contributions of trans people, while also drawing attention to the poverty, discrimination, and violence the community faces.

We understand how women's history tells the story of misogyny, which is the systemic mistreatment of women, girls, and feminine peoples through forms of physical and structural violence. But we rarely consider how it is linked to transmisogyny, which focuses on the complex intersections between transphobia and misogyny that are faced by trans women and girls, as well as transfeminine and gender non-conforming peoples. It is a term that attempts to capture multiple layers of gender-based marginalization and systemic mistreatment. If misogyny and transmisogyny are not combatted together, then the root of the problem will never truly be eradicated.

Although the past decade has seen a more vocal public push for diversity, equity, and inclusion initiatives around gender, the current sociopolitical climate in the United States is not supportive of, and is often openly hostile to, transgender and gender non-conforming individuals. Under this sphere of increased hostility is the explicit targeting of trans women and girls and transfeminine peoples with words, actions, and legislation. It is particularly important for women's organizations who seek to combat gender-based forms of oppression to build coalitions and take a stand against **misogyny and transmisogyny** in all its forms, because misogyny and transmisogyny come from the same place. They both describe gender-based oppression that results from the prioritization of masculinity alongside the degradation of femininity.

Targeted hostility against trans women and girls and transfeminine peoples can be seen not only in the alarming uptick in physical violence against this community, but also in the increasing persistence and intensity of public debates over whether or not trans women and girls and transfeminine peoples are "real women" that belong in "women's spaces," including gender-specific bathrooms, women's sports teams, and locker rooms. These debates prioritize misplaced and misunderstood claims of biological authenticity. They are dehumanizing and cannot be disconnected from other forms of violence as they normalize widespread and explicit marginalization and exclusion.

As a women's organization, the increasingly hostile environment for trans women and girls and transfeminine people should be at the forefront of our collective education and activism - -let's help ensure that history doesn't continue to repeat itself. Visit the Public Policy website to learn more.

## <u>Museum Group</u>

On Thursday, March 16, the Museum Group will go to the Legion of Honor to see the exhibit **SARGENT AND SPAIN.** This is the first exhibition to explore the influence of Spanish culture on John Singer Sargent's (1856-1925) visual practice. Many of the works are from the artist's personal collection.

Sargent was born in Italy to American parents who settled abroad. Sargent traveled with his parents in his youth. He was accepted into the Paris atelier of portraitist Charles Auguste Emile Durand, known as Carolus-Duran, where he developed his signature loose and flowing brushwork. He quickly established himself as one of the most sought-after society portraitists in Europe and America. He painted many wealthy subjects in the glamour of the Gilded Age.

Encouraged by Carolus-Duran, in 1879 and 1912, Sargent went to Spain to absorb its rich artistic heritage--museums, churches, palaces (notably the Alhambra and Generalife near Granada), gardens, urban and rural landscapes, and the rich cultural tradition of its people. His travels took him to 13 different locations in Spain.

Sargent frequently visited the Museo del Prado in Madrid. He produced a series of early oils after encountering the works of his aesthetic hero Diego Velazquez. During his first trip, Sargent was exposed to Spanish flamenco, which inspired some of his greatest works. Flamenco had its roots in Spanish Roma culture.

Sargent had great facility with watercolors, which he used to paint Islamic archaeological objects. He visited Majorca where he painted stunning landscapes and rich cultural traditions.

Sargent became interested in Spanish religion and spirituality. He captured the sumptuous materiality and spiritual power of the Catholic religious buildings and objects he saw in the cathedrals, crucifixions, and Madonnas.
