Our new Alameda Branch board members have been busy at work this summer preparing for interesting and fun programs for the new year. I hope you will be able to join us for all of them. I also wanted to remind you that this is the 100th year anniversary of the introduction of the ERA, (Equal Rights Amendment). This is the proposed 28th Amendment to the Constitution that guarantees equality, individual rights and social justice for a diverse and inclusive society. AAUW is advocating for the swift ratification and passage. That we have been waiting 100 years for this is almost unbelievable. Please contact your US Congress person and ask them to sign the discharge petition for House Joint Resolution 25, HJ Res. 25, This will allow for the removal of the ratification deadline and allow the ratification of the ERA as a Constitutional Amendment.

Our national organization is now sending me a list of individual donations coming from our branch. From January to June 2023 our branch had 10 donations totaling \$1175 that went to the Education and Training Fund and 8 donations totaling \$155 that went to the Greatest Needs Fund. Thanks so much to all of you who made contributions to these funds.

Tech Trek is a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) camp designed to develop interest, excitement, and self-confidence in young women who will enter eighth grade in the fall. It features hands-on activities in STEM-related fields. For our Alameda girls, all sleeping, eating, instructional and recreational facilities happen on the beautiful Sonoma State campus. The girls attend at no cost to them or their families, our branch raises the

funds—\$8,000--to send 8 campers (our largest cohort to date!). At our September luncheon, the girls will share their experiences and do some "show and tell" with their camp projects. HISTORICAL NOTE

This year marks the 25 th anniversary of Tech Trek which was founded in 1998 by Marie Wolbach, an AAUW California member with the help of an AAUW Community Action Grant. The purpose of the one-week camp was to make STEM fields exciting and accessible to girls in middle school. Currently it operates in about 22 sites around the country and surveys show that Tech Trek alums far surpass the national average in most advanced math and science courses and that the program introduced them to STEM college majors of which they were not previously aware as well as to new STEM careers.

The Alameda Branch began their program in 2001 after receiving a \$250 CA AAUW grant for a first time camper and a \$250 gift from a local software firm. At that time, camps in Northern California were held at Stanford University and Mills College.

AAUW Program Survey Summary of Findings

In an effort to find out what members enjoy presently about the branch, and to discover ideas for future branch activities, the Program Committee of Barbara Krummel, Kevis Brownson, Paula Biwer, and Karen Kenney prepared a survey this spring. We appreciate the thoughtful responses we received from thirty three of our members.

Our questions included:

- In what AAUW programs/activities have you attended/ participated in since January 2020?
- Of the existing programs, what are your 5 favorites?
- What new programs would you like to see offered by the Alameda Branch?
- If you would like AAUW Alameda to offer events with a speaker, what format of events would you attend?
- What is the maximum you would pay for any of these programs?
- What motivates you to be a member of AAUW Alameda Branch?
- What would you like to happen with the programs that AAUW provides or could provide?

The responses provided a wealth of information to guide us going forward. We were gratified to find out that members enjoyed a wide variety of activities provided by the branch, from ongoing interest groups to one time lectures or workshops. Of some new activities we suggested, there was interest in starting a new community service project, and in starting a GovTrek program.

One of our primary goals was to find out ideas for the schedule and structure of our branch meetings. Although luncheon meetings as we have done in the past are a popular option, members showed a lot of flexibility about the type of meetings we could have.

The free-form question responses provided feedback on recent programs, and guidance going forward on types of speakers and activities that would further engage members.

<u>Museum Group</u>

On Thursday, September 21, the Museum Group will travel to the Legion of Honor to see the exhibit **the TUDORS--Art and Majesty in Renaissance England**.

England's Tudor dynasty (1485-1603) was ambitious, ruthless, visionary, and magnificent. The dynasty was founded in 1485 when Henry Tudor decisively won the War of the Roses and usurped the throne from Richard III, the last king of the Plantagenet dynasty. With a dubious claim to kingship, Henry VII legitimized his reign and built alliances by marrying his children to foreign royals. Notoriously frugal, he did invest in art as a means of projecting the splendor and generosity befitting a king. An example of this was a cope (clerical vestment) in rich velvet cloth of gold emblazoned with the king's emblems which he commissioned for Westminster Abbey. Henry's reign marked England's transition from the late Middle Ages to the Renaissance.

His son Henry VIII was more confident of his power. He spent extravagantly on the construction of palaces and treasures to fill them. Henry VIII was inspired by the ideals of the Renaissance and desired the English court to rival his Continental counterparts. Many famous foreign artists were attracted to this court. Most notable of these is Hans Holbein the Younger, who painted the Portrait of Henry VIII of England in 1540.

During his later reign, Henry VIII became a tyrant, divorcing or executing four of his six wives, severing ties with the Roman Catholic Church in 1533, and establishing himself as Supreme Head of the Church of England.

The reigns of his three children were markedly different in character. Edward VI, who inherited the throne at age 9, brought radical Protestant reform. The brief reign of Henry's older, fanatically Catholic daughter, and first reigning queen, Mary, reconciled England with the papacy and reintegrated the kingdom with Catholic Europe through her marriage to Phillip II of Spain. Hundreds of Protestants were burned at the stake because of this.

The final Tudor monarch and Henry VIII's youngest daughter Elizabeth pursued a more modest Protestant policy. Encircled by Catholic enemies, Elizabeth achieved an unlikely victory against the Spanish Armada when they attempted to invade England. She never married. With most of Europe against her, she established diplomatic contact with Russia, the Ottoman Empire, and Morocco. During her long reign, English culture and art blossomed. Through art and poetry, the queen cultivated the image of a virgin deity wed to her people. The Hardwick Portrait exemplifies this.

There are many textiles on display as well. Henry VIII was a prodigious collector of tapestries woven in Flanders (Belgium) to display in his palaces.

All the items in this exhibit convey the splendor of the Tudor court, as well as the gradual evolution from the Late Middle Ages to the High Renaissance to the emergence of a national Elizabethan style.
