# **AAUW College Transfer Fund Receives Generous Donation From Transfer Student**

In 1962, John Oppedahl began his college education at the old Merritt College campus on Grove Street in Oakland, hoping to transfer to UC Berkeley after two years. In addition to his classes, John joined the school

newspaper which, he could not have known then, set him on the path to what would become a fulfilling and successful career.

John worked hard at his course work to earn the grades necessary to transfer to Cal, while learning how to be a journalist from courses and his work on the student newspaper. John did not have much money so he also worked nights pumping gas in Alameda.

John's hard work paid off. He transferred to Cal in the Fall of 1964. In addition to course work and his gas station job, John joined the campus newspaper, the Daily Californian, just as the Free Speech Movement erupted on the Cal campus. Eventually, John was able to quit his gas station job to become a stringer for the San Francisco Examiner, reporting on the Free Speech Movement, then-Governor Reagan's efforts to "control" campus sit-ins and the burgeoning antiwar movement, and continued to work on the Daily Californian, going from reporter to editor.

After graduation, John obtained a Masters Degree in Journalism from Columbia University and began a career that took him from reporter to editors and finally to publisher, first at the morning daily newspaper in Phoenix, the Arizona Republic, and later the San Francisco Chronicle.

Looking back at his education and career at age 80, John appreciates how valuable his community college education was in enabling him to transfer to Cal and to forge his career.

As a result, John has made a generous donation of close to \$8000 to our branch's community college transfer fund. John noted how much of a difference a small scholarship would have made to him and wants to help other students who need that financial boost now.

## Museum Group

We will have two museum trips in February!

On Thursday, **February 6** we will go to the de Young to see the exhibit Tamara de Lempicka (1894-1980). She was the artist who defined Art Deco painting. The exhibition covers the full arc of Lempicka's adventurous life and artistic development, from the post-Cubist training in early 1920's Paris, study of European old Masters, and interpretation of Russian avant-gardes, to her reflections on antiquity from her late years in North America. The exhibition presents the works that made Lempicka famous in the Paris Salon and in exhibitions in Italy, Poland, and the U.S.

A section will be devoted to the "new woman", as exemplified by Lempicka herself, who defies stereotypes both in fashion and social norms. One of her most famous paintings, The Lady with Gloves, the Girl in the Green Dress is featured on the cover of the Fine Arts magazine Fall 2024.

We will eat lunch at the cafeteria.

We will visit MOMA in San Francisco on February 20, and see:

Amy Sherald: American Sublime invites you to breathe. Come and be taken in by the colors, shapes, and forms painted by one of America's defining contemporary portraitists.

This exhibition presents nearly 50 of Amy Sherald's luminous paintings, including her iconic portraits of Michelle Obama and Breonna Taylor, poetic early works, and new works on view for the first time. Sherald's artworks convey the quiet power in everyday people and invite viewers to participate in a more complex debate about accepted notions of American identity.
