- Janet Dawson 's life of crime began with her long-running series featuring Oakland PI Jeri Howard and the award-winning first novel, *Kindred Crimes*. Jeri has sleuthed her way through 14 books, including the latest, *The Things We Keep*. Along the writing way, Janet branched out to books featuring crime-solving characters Jill McLeod, working on the California Zephyr trains, and Kay Dexter, a geriatric care manager. Janet has also written a standalone suspense novel, *What You Wish For*, a novella, *But Not Forgotten*, and twelve short stories, including Macavity winner "Voice Mail." She is a longtime member of Mystery Writers of America and Sisters in Crime. She blogs the first Monday of every month at Ladies of Mystery.
- Rebecca Gomez Farrell's Wings Rising epic fantasy duology is published by Meerkat Press. Her shorter speculative fiction works have appeared over thirty times in outlets such as *Beneath Ceaseless Skies, PULP Literature,* and *A Quiet Afternoon 1 & 2*. 
AAUW Alameda Wants Your Opinion, Please

Medi-Cal, which is the largest payer of maternity care in the country, serves 14.2 million Californians and received \$310.7 million from the federal government for reproductive healthcare in 2024. Last month, on January 27, the White House froze all federal grants.

Marilyn VanAman Sharron October 2, 1941 to January 30, 2025

Marilyn VanAman Sharron, 83, passed away on Thursday, January 30, 2025, after a brief illness. Marilyn will be remembered for her warmth, conversation, and faith that people are truly good at heart. She lived her life fully, with a focus on social justice and the fair treatment of all peoples. She held strong opinions on a variety of topics, and did not shy away from letting these opinions be known.

She is survived by her son, Matthew Sharron (Ayasha

Williams-Sharron) of Chevy Chase, MD, daughter Meghan Sharron (TJ Modelski) of Alameda, CA, grandchildren Kai (10) and Miles (7) Sharron, and Abigayle (12) and Myla (9) Modelski. She was preceded in death in 2011 by her husband of 47 years, A. Parker Sharron.

Marilyn was born in Canton, OH to Lynwood and Gladys VanAman. She graduated from Bowling Green State University with a BS in Business Administration (Marketing) in 1963. Upon graduation, she traveled to India with World University Service; she was heavily influenced by her work there and pivoted to a career in social service. Through these endeavors, she met her husband whom she married in Philadelphia in 1964. Together, they moved to Albany NY, where she earned a Master of Social Work degree (SUNY Albany) in 1968. In 1976, Marilyn and Parker moved to Syracuse, NY, where she worked as a social worker for Onondaga Pastoral Counseling Center (1978-1993), Upstate University Hospital (1990-2011), and Jewish Family Services (2011-2013). She also maintained a private therapy practice for many years, She was an active member of both Calvary Church and St. Paul's Episcopal Cathedral in Syracuse. In 2010, she received the NASW New York State Lifetime Achievement Award. In 2014, Marilyn moved to Alameda, CA to be near family. Here, she was engaged with Christ Episcopal Church, American Association of University Women (AAUW), Philanthropic Educational Organization (PEO), and community art classes. Throughout her life, Marilyn's spirituality was a guiding force; she believed in a higher power, purpose, and call to support her community.
